After his discharge from service they moved back to Louisiana. Carlene purchased a beauty salon in Bowling Green. After the couple moved to Bowling Green, Carlene sold her shop and went to work for Vera and Neil Parsons doing accounting and tax work. After eight years, Carlene and Keith purchased the business operated Wecott Tax Service until retiring in 1996. Carlene was a member of the First Presbyterian Church. She served as a Sunday School Teacher, Deacon, and three times as an Elder. She was active in the Fellowship, Building and Grounds and Budget/Finance committees. She was
